HOW CAN THE CHURCH OF TODAY BECOME THE CHURCH OF TOMORROW?

Society today is under constant pressure – we live in an exciting but uncertain era of change where nothing stands still for long. Technology makes us more connected yet more distant than ever before.

The economy is uncertain. World issues such as equality, poverty and immigration are as important as ever. As individuals, we have less time and more responsibilities competing for our attention. Our priorities are shifting and the question we need to ask today is how do we as a Church respond to these?

How do we broaden our appeal without diluting our message? And in a busy, crowded and diverse region, how do we ensure that our message of faith, hope and love is heard?

When it comes to answering these questions, we're guided by our vision. This document sets out our values, inspiration and goals, which in turn inform our actions and approach.

The Diocese of Manchester will face some specific challenges in the coming years:

28,100

Attendance figures in the last five years have dropped by 15% to 28,100. What will this figure look like in another five years' time?

Around a third of our churches have fewer than 35 weekly attendees, though 33 churches have more than 100 in weekly attendance.





In less than five years' time, the number of full time Stipendiary Clergy available in England will reduce by around 12%.

CAN THESE CHALLENGES BECOME OUR OPPORTUNITIES?

In 2011, the Bishop's Council began an extensive and long term process to identify the key issues facing the diocese. Some of these issues will probably be familiar to you – such as responding to an overall reduction in weekly church going and finding sustainable financial support.

We also face a number of practical challenges – how do we engage people and reach the communities surrounding us, when we have fewer clergy and fewer suitable worship spaces than ever before? The question of 'how can the Church of today be the Church of tomorrow' is driven by these key issues.

As serious as these challenges sound, they are also the basis of our transformation and development. Now we have identified them, we can begin to move forwards and consider how we can continue delivering our message of faith, hope and love in a relevant and sustainable way.

There are many examples of how churches are already responding to community needs: about a third regularly support or run their local food bank, for example.

THE START OF OUR CONVERSATION

Faith, hope and love. The values at the heart of our Church have never been more relevant or contemporary in today's society.

As people become busier, communities become more diverse and life becomes more demanding, it's more important than ever to reach out and embody our new vision: to become a worshipping, growing and transforming Christian presence at the heart of every community.

In delivering this mission, we can become a resilient, focused and relevant Church for a different world. In order to do this, we're focusing on a five key areas. Growth is key, whether we're working hard to engage everyone in our parishes, or supporting the clergy and congregations we already have. Our buildings may not always be fit for purpose so we're heading out into the community, delivering our message in a timely and relevant way.

And in order to drive these changes, we're working towards a mixed model of Church – where more people can take an active leadership role.

This is an opportunity for everyone within the diocese to get involved and face some key challenges together. To start the conversation, we've focused on five key areas that we're currently facing as a Church and as a diocese.




01 DELIVERING CHURCH




04 SPREADING SPIRITUALITY
